The Act would define coastal principles:

- The health of our coastal ecosystems is of fundamental importance to our environment, our economy and our way of life
- We must be able to make transparent, consistent, and timely coastal decisions that reflect Nova Scotian's coastal consensus
- We must have the tools to both avoid conflict and solve differences effectively when they arise
- Communities and individuals must play a substantive role in designing our coastal future

A Nova Scotia Coastal Act would:

- · Clearly define who's responsible
- Enable effective coastal management for planning and land use
- Establish coastal advisory boards
- Set targets and create mechanisms to protect coastal lands and public access
- Ensure ongoing research, monitoring and education
- Be comprehensive, coordinate existing legislation and include new coastal industries (aquaculture and marine renewable energy)
